

College Visitation Guide

Once you've narrowed your choices, it's important to actually visit the colleges you are considering before making a final decision.

When selecting colleges that interest you, include some private colleges that are outside of the state in which you reside. These schools usually provide better grants (*free money*).

If you can, visit four to six colleges before making your final selection.

Important Factors to Consider when Choosing a College

It's not only a college choosing you, it's also you choosing a college that meets your requirements. You are hiring them to provide the knowledge you need to succeed.

- Does the school provide high quality courses that meets or exceeds your expectations?
- Does the faculty stay current with what's happening in your field of study?
- Do they provide the latest technology in your field of study?
- Do you feel comfortable learning at a large or small school?
- Is classroom size important to you?
- Does campus life fit your personality?
- What do they offer for housing and food service?
- Do they offer a level of grant money (free money) that lowers your need for college loans?
- · What are the crime statistics on their campus?

Helpful Techniques to Ensure a Successful College Visitation

Make visitation arrangements with the colleges before you visit, preferably on a weekday during the school term to get a true picture of the school and life on campus. Only during this visit can you truly experience the environment in which you will live and study.

Thank You Note:

Students should send a thank you note to the admissions contact person after the visit outlining a few sincere thoughts and highlights from your visit.

- Faculty
